

Galaxy Supporters:


In the off season we made numerous changes for 2004 in hopes of providing you with a more entertaining team that commits players forward, creates more chances and scores goals.

The addition of Jovan Kirovski has helped Carlos Ruiz because Jovan covers a lot of ground, opens up space and forces the opponent to deal with him. Ruiz has rewarded us with a great start on par with his rookie season of 2002 with five goals in

the first four games. Andy Herzog provides an offensive threat from midfield with his passing and his shooting ability. Joseph Ngwenya has speed and runs at defenders. Ruiz, Jovan & Andy

The triple-edged sword in the Galaxy's attack · By Rigo Cervantez

Carlos Ruiz, Jovan Kirovski and Andreas Herzog are about as different as a Guatemalan, an American and an Austrian can be. They are as dif-


ferent as the three languages they speak: English, Spanish and German.

Collectively they have amassed almost 200 matches for their respective countries. Now, at different points in their careers, they find themselves sharing the same jersey and the hefty responsibility of increasing the Galaxy's goal production.


Though still early in the season, it is clear that the presence of players like Herzog and Kirovski in the Galaxy's starting eleven have made the Guatemalan goal-scorer even more dangerous.

"I think that between the three of us we can do great things this season," said Ruiz. "However, we still need to wait and see how the games play out, how the physical intensity affects us and hope that we are not hit hard by injuries. Only then can we achieve our team goal of winning a championship."

"Personally, I have gotten off to a good start. I have had the good fortune of scoring, but as (Continued on page 13)

usual, I know this comes from the strength of the team as whole," said the Guatemalan striker, now in his third year in Major League Soccer.

In the first stages of the 2004 season, the trio has already shown signs of its explosive potential, with "Pescadito" displaying traditional efficiency around the opponents' goal, averaging more than a marker a game and already on the path towards a third straight season of leading MLS in goals scored.

Carlos, more than just the "Little Fish" that his nickname belies, is a true shark in the penalty area. He is a relentless, versatile goal scorer who can find the back of the net from anywhere: the penalty spot, finishing off a play from mid-range, from the edge of the area, heading home a ball or, for that matter, using any other part of his body, as he demonstrated in his first goal of 2004, where he somehow chested down a pass into the New England Revolution net.


Perhaps most intriguing about Ruiz is his capacity to anticipate what defenders are going to do, elude them with his mobility and agility and get to the ball before them. These attributes are key to the offensive scheme of the club. Yet in order to truly make his mark, Ruiz needs services tailored to his specialty; balls coming in from either flank that he can turn into goals.

That is where the experience and talent of Andreas Herzog is truly appreciated. The veteran Austrian international has made it clear in pre-season as well as his first appearances on the

pitch during the 2004 MLS season that he wants to be the leader and "maestro" from midfield.

Herzog's play is defined by his vision of the workings of the game, the way he takes advantage of every space on the field, whether to elude a defender or to put a ball into space, finding teammates in a better place and putting opponents in the most compromising of circumstances, as well as changing the point of attack.

Herzog adjusts like a glove to the abilities of Carlos Ruiz and his teammates.

The connection between the Austrian and the Guatemalan has already produced dividends in the opening stages of the 2004 campaign, and has demonstrated itself as a grouping with indescribable potential.

If one needs any evidence, he/she should look no further than Herzog's first MLS goal against the Revolution, a wonderful triangular ball with Ruiz that resulted in a superb and precise angled shot that hit home.

The Austrian veteran is also goal dangerous on free kicks and throw-ins. "Yes, I think I will be able to score some goals off free kicks," he

said with a malicious grin, not wanting to lay the Galaxy's scoring burden on just three players. "It cannot only be the three of us. The team needs a solid defense, needs to maintain a compact shape and the whole team needs to help out in the attack, although it is obvious that as midfielders and forwards, we must score the majority of the goals."

The third part of this Galaxy trilogy, Jovan Kirovski has also already found the net this season and set up a critical game-tying goal in Colorado. He has shown that he is a multi-functional player, a welcome strike mate up front with Carlos Ruiz and someone who can also fill other roles in the tactical scheme composed by Sigi Schmid and Martin Vasquez.

"I'm sure that the three of us can combine for great offensive production and we have already demonstrated that in the first part of the season. But I feel that we can still improve our play since the season has just begun," said Kirovski, who by constantly moving forward during all 90 minutes of a

match has converted himself into an element that ruins opposing defensive schemes and allows for more liberty and space for Ruiz.

Jovan, who, thanks to his return to California, has once again been given the opportunity to wear the colors of his National Team, can also play along the touchlines or just behind the point of the attack, like a link between the midfield and Ruiz. Because of this versatility his creations often lend a great deal of support for the Galaxy offense.

Without a doubt, the trio of Carlos, Jovan and Andy make up the best formula for the club to attack their opponent's goal during the 2004 season, making the Galaxy a serious contender to bring home MLS Cup 2004.





paña como jugador de la Major League Soccer.

Y ciertamente, en las primeras escaramuzas

de la temporada 2004 este trío ya dio muestras de su explosivo potencial, con un 'Pescadito' iniciando con su tradicional efectividad ante la portería enemiga, llegando a promediar más de un gol por juego, en ruta a su tercer año como mejor goleador de la liga.

Indudablemente que la presencia de jugadores como Herzog y Kirovski en el once galáctico han acentuado las virtudes del goleador guatemalteco.

Carlos, más que un simple 'Pescadito', es un verdadero tiburón dentro del área. Es un rematador implacable, por su versatilidad, ya que lo mismo puede realizar el gol en el cobro de un penal, desde el manchón de los once metros, finalizar la jugada con un remate de media distancia, más allá de las fronteras del área, que hacer un gol con golpe de cabeza y hasta utilizando otras partes del cuer-


po, pues ya se dio el caso de un 'Do de Pecho' de Ruiz, un tanto donde el balón fue impulsado con el pecho justamente.

Estos atributos, bien aplicados en la zona de definición, lo convierten en todo un arsenal dentro del esquema ofensivo del equipo.

Y para hacer explosión, Ruiz necesita servicios adecuados a su especialidad, balones que lleguen de los costados para que él los convierta en goles.

Ahí es donde entra en la escena la sapiencia de Andreas Herzog, pues el veterano interna-

cional austríaco ya dejó en claro desde la (Continuado)





pretemporada en Francia, lo mismo que en sus primeras salidas en el campeonato 2004 de la MLS, que quiere ser el líder, el maestro y el conductor del equipo desde la media cancha.

Con su visión del rectángulo de juego y la forma en que aprovecha cada espacio de terreno para danzar como en un ballet, ya sea para escabullirse a la marca de los rivales o para filtrar el balón en la más comprometida de las situaciones, para conectar con el compañero mejor ubicado o para cambiar el rumbo del ataque y dotar de ritmo y pausa el funcionamiento galáctico, Herzog se ajusta como anillo al dedo a la propuesta futbolística de Carlos Ruiz.

La conexión entre el austríaco y el guatemalteco ya ha producido magníficos dividendos en el arranque de la campaña y se antoja como una sociedad con




un potencial indescriptible.

Como muestra puede quedar el primer tanto que realiza Herzog en la MLS, justo en su debut frente al Revolution, culminando una hermosa triangulación con Ruiz con un soberbio y preciso remate cruzado.

Porque, además de que Andy no se cansa de ponerle balones a sus atacantes y en especial a Ruiz, el veterano austríaco también es una amenaza de gol en tiros libres y en remates de volea.

"Sí, creo que puedo anotar algunos goles de (Continuado)



tiro libre", confió con una maliciosa sonrisa Herzog, quien sin embargo fue claro al puntualizar que la producción ofensiva del Galaxy puede ser sólo la responsabilidad de tres hombres: "No podemos ser sólo EI tres. equipo requiere de solidez defensiva, mantenerse compacto y todo el equipo debe colaborar en la ofensiva. Aunque es obvio que los mediocampistas y los delanteros somos los que debemos anotar la mayoría de los goles".

En cuanto el tercer elemento de ésta trilogía, Jovan Kirovski, también ha encontrado la red, mostrándose además como un jugador plurifuncional, que lo mismo es el socio de Carlos Ruiz en el frente de ataque, que un elemento que desempeña otras funciones en el esquema táctico de Sigi Schmid y Martín Vázquez.

"Estoy seguro que los tres podemos lograr una buena producción ofensiva y ya To demostramos en los primeros juegos, pero siento que aun debemos mejorar. La temporada acaba de empezar," comenta Kirovski, quien a base de una

enorme disposición, de movilidad y de luchar durante los noventa minutos, se convierte en un elemento que desquicia los esquemas defensivos rivales y propicia mayores libertades y espacios para Carlos Ruiz.

Además, Jovan, quien gracias a su retorno a California ha vuelto a ser considerado con mayor continuidad para vestir la casaca de la selección nacional, se puede desempeñar por

los costados y detrás del eje de ataque, como un 'enganche', por lo que sus evoluciones se convierten en un enorme aporte para el esquema ofensivo del Galaxy.

Pele and Adu


One is a legend, the other just might become one someday By Michael Lewis

Separated by a generation or so, Pele and Freddy Adu made their much-anticipated American debuts in some ways similar, yet somewhat disparate circumstances.

Pele journeyed to the United States in 1975 nearing the end of an extraordinary career with a reputation second to none after leading Brazil to (Continued on page 22)

an unprecedented three world championships in four attempts. He had one final mission: to boost American soccer.

Adu journeyed to the U.S. with his mother and brother from Ghana to find a new life and is just kicking off his career. While starting to cast a shadow for himself at the tender age of 14 as a rookie forward for D.C. United, Adu still has a long way to go to match the incredible feats of the Black Pearl. He is the future of American soccer.

As it turned out, it didn't take either player long to find the back of the net, Adu in his third MLS match, Pele in his second official North American Soccer League game.

Only weeks prior, the 34-year-old Pele had stunned the soccer world by coming out of retirement and signing a three-year, \$4.5 million contract with the New York Cosmos, an unheard of sum in those days.

The Cosmos trumpeted Pele's signing with a special, nationally televised exhibition

match against the Dallas Tornado and Kyle Rote, Jr., the best-known American player at the time, at Downing Stadium on Randalls Island in New York City on June 15, 1975.

He scored a goal – a 71st-minute header – but since it was a friendly it did not count in his NASL totals (although it is counted among his personal goal total of 1,282 in 1,363 appearances).


Pele made his NASL debut at Randalls against Toronto Metros-Croatia on June 18, but failed to score. Likewise vs. the Boston Minutemen and Portuguese great Eusebio several days later.

Next came the Rochester Lancers at Holleder Stadium, which was built for high school football after World War II. A crowd of 14,562 – 10,000 more than the team's average attendance – packed the rickety structure on June 27.

Edson Arantes do Nascimento began to show fans why the world knows him as Pele and the most exciting soccer player on the (Continued on page 24)

planet, twice forcing goalkeeper Ardo Perri to come out of the nets to make two diving stops.

Finally, in the 31st minute the Cosmos' Julio Correa took a long, hard shot that bounded off the crossbar. The ball bounced once as Pele raced in on the left side and headed the ball past Perri.

An exuberant Pele punctuated it with his signature goal celebration, leaping and punching the air with his right arm. Chants of "Pele! Pele!" could be heard from the crowd as the Cosmos took their first steps toward a 3-0 victory.

"This is just normal in my progress," he said after the game

through his confidante and interpreter, Prof. Julio Mazzei. "In my first two games, I didn't know my teammates. Tonight I felt more comfortable on the field. You could see it. I started to take my forward position as the game went on."


Pele started the game at midfield behind three forwards.

"He knew what he was doing out there," Cosmos Hall of Fame defender and captain Werner Roth said. "Because of that, he relaxed the team. He helped take pressure off the rest of the forwards."

While he did not figure in the final two goals, Pele certainly began to find his footing.

"Pele's getting much more aggressive on the field," said Cosmos coach Gordon Bradley, another Hall of Famer. "He's more confident of himself.

"Even if he hadn't scored tonight, he played a strong game. This was the first time he had some prolonged runs. And, he created a lot of openings for our midfielders and forwards." (Continued on page 26)

Some 29 years later on April 17, 2004, Adu, who had all of 74 minutes of pro experience under his belt entering the match, became the youngest MLS player to score in a pro soccer match and probably one of the youngest in history (international records are sketchy) against the MetroStars and in front of 31,419 curious souls at Giants Stadium.

With the score tied at 1-1 in the 54th minute, Adu replaced New Jersey product Alecko Eskandarian – son of former Cosmos star Andranik Eskandarian – before the MetroStars struck twice.

Then it was time for Adu to take center stage in the 75th minute. Josh Gros sent a pass from the left side into the six-yard box while Adu managed to slip away from defender Chris Leitch. A sliding Adu knocked ball past goalkeeper Jonny Walker with his left foot into the middle of the net from six yards.

Adu became the youngest MLS player to score at 14 years, 320 days – his birthday is June 2 – breaking the record by United teammate Santino Quaranta (16 years, 217 days in 2001).

"I had to work really hard to get that goal because I was way behind the defender," Adu said. "I kind of threw myself in front of him and threw my foot in there. It was a great feeling. I can't really explain it."

Adu admitted he did not have time to celebrate because United needed another score in what was a 3-2 loss. "It gave our team a chance," he said. "But unfortunately we didn't capitalize on it."

The goal was a confidence booster to someone people forget is still a teenager.

"To be able get that goal, it taught me something about myself," Adu said. "First of all, that I can really do this. And second of all I'm excited. No matter what happens I'm going to keep fighting for that goal.

"It takes a lot of pressure off of me."

Pele, incidentally, scored his first pro goal for Santos in a 7-1 rout of

the Corinthians on Sept. 7, 1956. He was 15 years, 10 months old.

According to an account in "The Pele Albums," Pele tallied his first pro goal in the 35th minute after he replaced Del Vecchio.

According to the two-volume book: "Pele, who was making his official debut with Santos, joined forces with Raimundo and Jair. The goal that followed was the result of perfect teamwork. Alone in front of the net, Pele brought the Santos score to six."

That was the first of 1,282 goals.

Adu is just starting his scoresheet.

The Halfway Point

Does leading at the midpoint of the season translate into Conference Championships? By Peter Hirdt

magine walking to the betting window at Belmont Park or Hollywood Park, glancing over your shoulder to see who's leading at the half-mile pole, and


telling the clerk, "I'll put a hundred to win on the six." Sadly life isn't that easy, or none of us would need a day job.

Even at a track like Belmont, where closers benefit in one-mile races and speed horses fail to hold their leads as often as they do at Hollywood Park, knowing which horse is in front at the midpoint would be a money-winning bet. So why should Major League Soccer be any different?


The fact is, MLS is no different. Teams leading their conference at the season's midpoint have historically crossed the wire in front about two-thirds of the time. But it might not seem that way based on results from the past few seasons alone.

Quick quiz: Which team led the Eastern Conference at the midpoint of both the 2002 and 2003 seasons? If you guessed the MetroStars, you're right. Yes, the same Metro club that failed to qualify for the postseason in 2002 and was eliminated in the first round of last season's playoffs. Still, as MLS teams headed into the July 4 holiday two summers ago, the

MetroStars held the lead in the East — albeit a shaky one-point lead — with a 6-6-2 record. Last (Continued on page 30)



D.C. United won the inaugural MLS Cup title despite having a losing record at the midway point of that first season in 1996.





season, they looked stronger at the half, leading the conference by three points on the strength of a 7-4-4 mark. But in both seasons, the Metros struggled through the second half of the season to disappointing finishes.

However, as noted above, those are exceptions to the rule. Including the Metros' two failed opportunities to capture their first Eastern Conference title, 11 of the 17 teams that had sole possession of their division or conference leads at the midpoint finished the regular season on top. The following table shows the record of each midseason leader along with its final position in the standings.

the increase in come-from-behind conference champs is parity. Over the first three seasons of MLS play, teams in first place at the season's midpoint held leads that averaged 7.2 points. Over the

next three seasons, that average declined to 4.8; and for the last two seasons, it was just 2.5 points. Despite the success of fast-starting clubs, you

Despite the success of fast-starting clubs, you might think that strong second halves produce more MLS Cup champions, with hot teams domi-

nating the postseason. But five of the eight champions actually posted better records during the first half of the season than the second, with each of the last two seasons again providing exceptions: The 2002 Galaxy had a far better record after midseason (10-3-1) than before (6-6-2), and last season's Earthquakes were slightly better during the second half (8-4-3) than the first (6-3-6). The only other MLS Cup champ to improve during the second half of the season was D.C. United in 1996.

So it's clear that the overall trend has been for MLS teams leading midway through the season to win their conference or division titles. But the increased parity in recent seasons has increased the chance that teams will come from off the pace to take the title with a late second-half run.

Peter Nowak and the Chicago Fire started strong in their first season – and finished with the MLS Cup in 1998.

MLS Reaches Hall of Fame


Wynalda and Caligiuri become first MLS players elected to the National Soccer Hall of Fame, Class of 2004 · By Jason Halpin

Tormer Major League Soccer players were elected to the National Soccer Hall of Fame for the first time this year, as Eric Wynalda and Paul Caligiuri joined U.S. women's National Team star Michelle Akers in the Class of 2004.

The election of all three players was announced at a press conference at the Home Depot Center in Carson, Calif. on May 5.

Both Wynalda and Caligiuri might forever be (Continued on page 36)

remembered for one particular moment in each of their careers. For Wynalda, his came on April 6, 1996, when he scored the 88th-minute game winner for the San Jose Clash against D.C. United in the first game in league history, the first goal ever scored in MLS play.

Wynalda praised Caligiuri, who helped Wynalda become the first American to play in the German Bundesliga.

"It's a very special day for me," Wynalda said. "It's pretty special for me because I'm going in with Paul. As a player, he was always kind of a mentor to me ... He was my first roommate, and he was trying to get to the German first division. And when it turned out that the opportunity came up for me to go to the German first division, he was a very integral part of it. I'll never forget that."

For a decade, Wynalda was a fixture in attack for the U.S. men's National Team. In 106 appearances,

he scored 34 goals, the most by any player in the history of the National Team. He also appeared in three FIFA World Cups (1990, 1994, 1998) and was a part of the U.S. team that advanced to the semifinals of Copa America in 1995, defeating South American power Argentina 3-0 in the process.

Wynalda also played for six years in MLS, scoring 34 goals in nearly 100 games while playing with the Clash, Miami Fusion, New England Revolution and Chicago Fire.

Wynalda took time out to thank the coaches who have helped him along the way, including current Los Angeles Galaxy head coach Sigi Schmid.

"There are a lot of people to thank," he said. "Sigi Schmid is one of the coaches who first recognized me at a very young age and gave me an opportunity.

"I'm honored. This is something that I look at as the best part of my career so far."

Caligiuri's moment came almost before Wynalda's, six-and-a-half years November 19, 1989 in Port-of-Spain, Trinidad. In a World Cup qualifier against Trinidad and Tobago, Caligiuri netted the only goal of the game - a goal now referred to as "The Goal Heard 'Round the World" - to clinch the USA's first World Cup appear.

ance since 1950.

Caligiuri looked back fondly at his time as a player for the U.S. National Team, Columbus Crew and Los Angeles Galaxy. He now focuses his energy on being the head coach of the men's and women's soccer programs at Cal Poly-Pomona.

"My commitment to the game is far from over. There are so many things I have to think about and have great memories of, from making friends to traveling to far places and having great experiences on and off the soccer field," Caligiuri said.

Caligiuri, a long-time U.S. international, amassed 110 caps (mostly as a defender) and appeared in (Continued on page 38) (Continued from page 36)

Caligiuri played six years in MLS from the league's inception until 2001, the first with Columbus Crew and the last five with the Los Angeles Galaxy.

Akers referenced the history of soccer in the United States and humbly acknowledged her place alongside the people who have built up the sport in this country.


"This sport is a great one, and it's been going on a long time," she said. "There have been a lot of outstanding individuals over the course of that time that have put it on the map. It's really an honor for me to be included with some of those people."

Akers is widely considered one of the best female soccer players in the history of the game, and one the best living soccer players regardless of gender. In early March, she was named to the "FIFA 100," actually a list of the world's 125 greatest living soccer players, compiled by Pele and approved by FIFA.

Akers appeared in three FIFA Women's World Cups, leading the USA to world championships in 1991 and 1999. She scored 105 goals in 153 appearances with the National Team.

In a statement, MLS Commissioner Don Garber lauded both Wynalda and Caligiuri, saying both had a "trail-blazing spirit" that was exhibited through their ventures with the U.S. National Team, in European soccer and in MLS.

"This spirit, exhibited throughout your U.S. men's National Team careers, from your pioneering experi-

ences among the first wave of Americans plying their trade overseas, to your overwhelming commitment to return stateside and develop the American professional game through Major League Soccer, has provided multiple generations of soccer fans and players with the opportunity to pursue their soccer dreams," Garber said.

"Now that your playing careers are over, you continue to tap into that spirit to promote the game we all love and push the sport forward at all levels through your coaching and broadcasting efforts, something we all appreciate. Adding to the list of firsts, we can proudly say that Paul and Eric are the first two Hall-of-Famers in MLS history."

All three players will be enshrined Columbus Day weekend, Oct. 9-11, at the National Soccer Hall of Fame in Oneonta, N.Y.

The Long and Winding Road

Qualifying for the FIFA World Cup begins anew this year as a number of MLS stars chase their dreams of Germany 2006

t doesn't seem that long ago that fans all over the USA were walking around sleep-deprived, getting up at all hours of the morning (or not even going to bed!) to follow the exploits of their


heroes at Korea/Japan 2002. The nerve-wracking advancement to the second round, the thrilling defeat of border rival Mexico, then the oh-so-close loss to perennial power Germany – it was all part of a wonderful run that enthralled us all.

Now barely two years later, and the USA – like just about every other country in the world – has to start all over again to try and quality for the FIFA World Cup. Only host Germany has a free pass this time – even defending champion Brazil has to try and win its place in the final 32 teams.


While the exploits of the USA will be of primary focus for most followers of Major League Soccer beginning this summer, there are a number of countries both within the CONCACAF region and outside that will generate interest within MLS – and not just because they could be potential rivals for the Red, White and Blue. Players from all 10 teams in the league will be heading off to represent their

nations and try to reach soccer's biggest stage, the World Cup finals.

Of course, the place to start is with Bruce Arena's (Continued on page 42)

players involved in CONCACAF qualifying.

boys. In actuality, qualifying in CONCACAF - the region comprising North and Central America and

the Caribbean – began at the start of the year, when 20 Caribbean countries kicked things off in home-and-home series. Those 10 winners now join the rest of the region in a set of 12 home-and-home series starting in June, the winners of each of those moving to the semifinal round.

In Korea, half of the players on the U.S. National Team came from Major League Soccer, and there's no reason to expect that teams selected for qualifying matches will have any fewer. In fact, the USA's next-to-last preparatory friendly before beginning World Cup qualifying came against arch-rival Mexico – and all but one of the players chosen by Arena ply their trade in MLS.

The road for the USA begins on June 13, when they play host to Grenada at Columbus Crew Stadium. For any MLS players there will be a familiar face wearing the green, yellow and red of their Caribbean rival

 New England Revolution midfielder Shalrie Joseph, who was a key figure in Grenada's easy advancement past Guyana in the first round.

The return leg of the Group 1 tie will be in St. George's, Grenada a week later, and should the USA advance, they would move into a four-team group that will also feature some known opposition.

Group 2 features El Salvador taking on Bermuda. El Salvador has been a steady supplier of talent since the first days of MLS, and it's certainly no different now. D.C. United forward Ronald Cerritos has been making a bid for regular inclusion, and United teammate Eliseo Quintanilla also has National Team experience.

Group 3 will figure players from MLS on both sides of the ball when Haiti takes on Jamaica. Colorado Rapids striker Jean-Philippe Peguero impressed and earned a contract after leading Haiti in their preliminary round victory against Turks & Caicos Islands (who had Dallas winger Gavin Glinton in their side).


After the USA, Jamaica features the largest concentration of MLS players in any national selection. Chicago Fire midfielder Andy Williams, Los Angeles




Revolution midfielder Shalrie Joseph will provide the opposition when Grenada faces the USA to begin FIFA World Cup qualifying in June.

Galaxy defender Tyrone Marshall and MetroStars defender Craig Ziadie have been regulars in technical director Carl Brown's team for most of the last year. New MetroStars signing Fabian Taylor has also been a regular for the Reggae Boyz, while Chicago Fire forward Damani Ralph has been bidding for a regular place after his Rookie of the Year performance a year ago, as has Kansas City defender Shavar Thomas. 



"Southern California currently has the best youth systems in America for developing players and the Galaxy is not looking to reinvent the wheel, so instead we wanted to augment an already successful environment," said Hamilton. "We're blessed in Southern California to have a great youth system in place and all we wanted to do is to supply additional resources for the very elite player."

One key to the PDP is the leadership and Hamilton feels the people in place right now are what make the program so unique and special.

"Sam George, Don Ebert and Gary Sparks have spent a lot of time and energy on the PDP and really deserve credit for making this happen. Their knowledge and grasp of the local market is an asset and we are blessed to have them partner in this project."

The 2004 PDP program begins June 2, finishes mid-November and will offer 30 spots for both boys and girls in each of the following age groups; U-16, U-17 and U-19. Club coaches will nominate their players and a selection committee will finalize rosters, which will be continually upgraded and changed throughout the year based on performance. New Director of Youth Development, Ralph Perez will be scouring Southern California's fields for the best talent and is convinced the Galaxy will be able to find talent right in its own backyard.

"We think southern California has the best club systems going in the world and the Galaxy felt we could be an enhancement and supplement to what was already happening and take it to a new level," said Perez. El PDP les ayudará a pulir sus virtudes y mostrarse como futbolistas.

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Lo que convierte al PDP en un proyecto inigualable es el énfasis en la calidad. Ya sea por la seguridad de que cada sesión de entrenamiento supere las expectativas del jugador o la posibilidad de renovación del grupo con los jugadores más talentosos, el PDP ofrece de todo.

Otro de los variados beneficios del programa es que el costo para los participantes es: CERO.

El PDP está especialmente comprometido a buscar lo mejor del talento entre las ligas y entre la Comunidad Latina donde Pérez ha proyectado su influencia para asegurar a éste sector la misma oportunidad de acceso a éste novedoso programa.**

El diseño permite edificar el programa en forma ascendente de tal suerte que los mejores futbolistas jóvenes sean quienes busquen integrarse al proyecto, algo que facilitará su descubrimiento revertiendo el proceso de búsqueda.

Adicionalmente, el Galaxy trabaja estrechamente con varios proyectos dedicados al futbol juvenil, incluyendo la Copa LA, un torneo de categoría juvenil que abre las puertas a clubes Latinos pertenecientes a ligas no afiliadas a la Asociación Estatal. La Copa Juvenil Los Angeles se celebra por tercer año consecutivo, entre el 20 y el 31 de mayo, 2004, en la que compiten más de 100 equipos, teniendo como sede al Complejo de Futbol de

Lancaster. Algunos de los participantes de Copa LA han logrado llamar la atención de selecciones juveniles de México y Costa Rica, y ahora se convierte en una vitrina para el programa PDP.

Pérez se muestra muy optimista por la buena recepción hacia el PDP por parte de la Comunidad Latina.

"La respuesta ha sido fantástica", comentó Pérez. "Lo que me dicen es que finalmente la Comunidad Latina tendrá un oportunidad para que sus muchachos tengan la posibilidad de mostrar su talento."

Con el liderazgo del Galaxy y el apoyo del Home Depot Center lo mismo que de Nike (proveedor de indumentaria y equipo) junto a los mejores socios comerciales del futbol estadonidense, todos los involucrados creen que la organización PDP rápidamente se convertirá en el mejor programa para el desarrollo del talento jóven en el futbol del país.

Hamilton acepta que su deseo final es que los mejores jugadores se queden en las filas del Galaxy, pero reconoce que éste programa tiene mayores objetivos.

The New Guys

Four young Galaxy players are making their marks in MLS


The Los Angeles Galaxy's 2004 rookie class of Chris Aloisi, Josh Gardner, Ned Grabavoy and Joseph Ngwenya recently sat down with Galaxy Communications and discussed their soccer careers so far and their paths to where they are today.

Los Angeles Galaxy Midfielder Josh Gardner On his beginnings in the game ...

"I decided to start playing soccer when Glenn Davis first approached my family and said that he saw something in me. The first club I played for was the Hurricanes Youth Soccer Club; I stayed with them until I graduated from high school. I got a lot of experience playing with them. We went to Mexico a few times and we trained with Atlas for weeks on end and played against teams in Mexico, so I was exposed to a different soccer culture."

On his college career ...

"The first letter I ever got from a college was UConn, who was coming off a national championship. It was an honor to get a letter from them, but I also had to weigh my options. One of the things I wanted to do was get as much playing time as possible. I really didn't know where that was going to lead me. Cincinnati got a hold of me and made me



a good offer on a scholarship and also offered my major, digital design ... Coming in (as a freshman), I got to play a lot of minutes. I started every game and finished in the top three on the team in goals and assists. "

On his last steps on the path to MLS ...

"I was first discovered by Patrick McCabe (an agent) when I was playing for the U.S. U-20 team in Houston. I was playing left back at the time. Patrick saw something in me and started telling some MLS coaches about me and the next thing you know, I'm a project-40 player out here in LA."

Los Angeles Galaxy Mofielder Ned Grabavoy On his beginnings in the game ...

"I started out my career in soccer as most American kids do in this country. First, I played in recreation leagues and playing with my friends. I really did not get serious about soccer until I was about 12; that's when I joined the Chicago Magic Soccer Club. This is one of the best clubs in the country as far as producing players, and since the age of 14, I have been involved with several U.S. youth national teams. That exposed me to some good competition against some European and South American national teams, which has helped my development a lot."

"My junior and senior years of high school, I went on trial with a couple of different European clubs, Feyenoord (Holland) and VFB Stuttgart (Germany) and actually spent a week with Bayern Munich. All those different trials helped me realize what it was like at the next level and what I needed to work on."


On his college career and his path to MLS ...

"I thought that it would be best that I go to college and work on some parts of my game, things I needed to do to get to the next level. My choices were UCLA, Indiana and Virginia. It was a pretty easy choice to go to Indiana and I'm very happy that I made that decision. That time was when I learned the things that I needed to learn the most, especially as far as individual and team defending and

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what it is like to play as a group, not an individual, which is what you see in most American kids,



because in their club teams are pretty much allowed to do as they please. Getting three years' experience in college was very important as was having the chance to play in the U-20 World Championship

before I signed my Project-40 contract was also a good opportunity to showcase myself and represent my country again. I got picked up by LA in the draft and I'm excited and happy to be here."

Los Angeles Galaxy Defender Chris Aloisi On his beginnings in the game ...

"When I was younger, I did the same that most every kid does, played with youth teams, played travel ball, before I made my biggest jump to playing high school soccer for St. John the Baptist in West Islip (Long Island, NY). It's known around the country as one of the top high school teams, usually ranked in the top ten every year. My high school has had the biggest impact on me thus far in my soccer career."

On his college career ...

"After high school, I had to decide on one of



three schools, Syracuse, St. John's and South Carolina. It was a tough decision. I went to Syracuse after I was very close to going to St. John's because I thought it was the best fit for me. I played there for four years, started at various positions, mostly in the back. Like I

said I learned a great deal in high school; once I got to college I just tried to add on as much to the game I had already established as possible."

On his final path to MLS

"I was invited out the (2004 MLS Player) combine. I had no idea I was going to get drafted. It was an honor to get selected. I have been fortunate enough that Sigi and Doug have taken me in on the team and will do all I can to help the team win MLS Cup this year."

Los Angeles Galaxy Forward Joseph Ngwenya On his beginnings in the game ...

"I started playing soccer when I was five or six (in Bulawayo, Zimbabwe). I played for junior teams there at

home. I also went to high school in Zimbabwe. We won the national high school championship. My coach there knew a coach here in the U.S. and he helped me get a scholarship. I was actually looking at three schools, Coastal Carolina and South Carolina and Dartmouth College. I



ended up choosing Coastal Carolina because it was near the beach and I heard the climate was warmer."

On his final path to MLS ...

"The only club team I every played for in the U.S. was the Cape Cod Crusaders (PDL) last summer. There were players from Boston College and Yale University on the team, and some other colleges as well; we managed to win the national championship. That experience helped me make the transition to the next level."

"I got invited to the combine. While I was there, I played on the same team as Ned. We played a couple of games there. I don't think I had a convincing performance there but Doug and Sigi kept their faith in me and they picked me as their first overall choice in the draft."

On the how he sees his role in 2004 ...

"I am excited to be here and I'm hoping that I will be able to help the team wherever I'm needed. This first year for me is going to be a great learning experience because of the transition from college to the professional game, which is going pretty smoothly right now because of the professionals on the Galaxy that have played in this league for a couple of years who have helped me."


Galaxy midfielder **Jovan Kirovski** is the only American to ever have been a part of a team that won the UEFA Champions League. Kirovski won the
