Changes have LA Galaxy looking ahead · By Allen Hopkins

When the Galaxy's off-season began somewhat unexpectedly on a dreary San Jose night last November, the aim for this season was clear then

and even clearer now.

More in '04!

While you could put "more" in front of plenty of areas after 2003, the biggest key to this season is a "more" balanced goal scoring attack.

"Going into last season, I felt we needed to add another quality attacking player and we never did. It was a hole we tried to fill all last season," head coach Sigi Schmid said.


Remarkably last season, Carlos Ruiz accounted for 57% (15g, 5a -35 pts), of the Galaxy's 35 goals, a slight increase from his 2002 MVP season, when he accounted for 56% (24g, 1a - 49 pts).

The 24-year-old Ruiz feels his is plenty capable of shouldering the scoring load and his mentality is essential to the team's success.

"Every player has his own responsibilities on the field and mine is to score goals," Ruiz proudly but quietly claims. That translates easily in both English and Spanish.

Despite Ruiz's efforts, the search for a balanced attack was clearly the focal point of the Galaxy's off-season re-tooling, but ironically the important changes up front began in the back.


By all accounts the Galaxy have the players dynamic and disciplined enough to manage and control the attacking third, starting with former Werder Bremen and Austrian international Andreas Herzog.

"Andreas Herzog gives us a player not only deadly on set pieces but also a player who has made his living and is renowned for hitting that final pass. Putting him in a position where he plays off Carlos gives us tremendous options," Scmid says.

North County San Diego product Jovan Kirovski returns to So Cal with tons of experience, medals and plenty to prove after a 10-year European adventure that included a baptism at Manchester United and a Champions League trophy with Borussia Dortmund.

"It is great to be back here and it is something that I have been thinking about for a long time," Kirovski says.

"Jovan brings positive energy to the club. If he makes one run and doesn't get it, he'll make anoth-(Continued)

er. He's confident running at people, he'll find Carlos and he can finish chances as well," Sigi adds.

Kirovski, who'll play as a striker, feels his impact will be immediate. "I'll bring some creativity to the attack, score goals and offensively just help out. Carlos scored a lot of goals the past two seasons, and he needs support. I hope I can do that through playing and thinking faster and help speed up our play."

The Galaxy also expects to get strong and immediate attacking contributions from a rookie class, arguably the deepest in MLS.

Joseph Ngwenya, the Galaxy's No. 1 pick in the 2004 SuperDraft, was easily the best striker in the country at unfashionable Coastal Carolina, where he led the NCAA in goals his final two seasons.

The Galaxy's top pick talks softly but carries a big "goal-scoring" stick and isn't overwhelmed by lofty expectations.

"I am used to them. The expectations are high; it's my first year at a higher and tougher level. But I know I can contribute right away with my finishing touch."

A SuperDraft day steal is second round Project-40 midfielder Ned Grabavoy.

"I don't know why Ned slipped to 14th but we're happy we got him," says Schmid. "He's a smart player. He knows where the ball needs to go, he's good on set pieces and he doesn't turn the ball over."

Grabavoy, a former U.S. Under-20 international, describes himself as "a creative linking midfielder who likes to combine with the forwards," something he did quite often in leading Indiana to the NCAA title in 2003.

Ned has great feel for the game and his winning attitude is exactly what the Galaxy were looking for. "Everyone knows it's a team effort, my biggest goal is to help the team be successful,"he says.

Factor in Josh Gardner of Cincinnati and the club is confident, and only time will tell that they had a superb draft.

More in '04 also pertains to the returning cast of characters who all have to increase their offensive production, including the only original member of the Galaxy left remaining, Cobi Jones.

Schmid isn't buying that Cobi, 34, is past the productive years of his illustrious career. "Cobi knows 2003 was not a typical type of Cobi year. What has made Cobi great over the years is he's a competitor with tons of pride."

Fast-improving Venezuelan international Alejandro Moreno, whom Sigi praises as "an hon-

est player who gained lots of confidence last season," has emerged a worthy understudy to Ruiz's star billing.

Versatile Sasha Victorine, always a solid contributor, is healthy after missing a good portion of last season with a hip injury, and will play more inside.

Both Pete Vagenas and Memo Gonzalez are expected to raise their level as the Galaxy seek more balance in the middle third.

While the attack has gotten the bulk of the club's attention this off-season, it isn't the only project within the team, as there have also been chemistry and attitude adjustments.

Ruiz summed up last season best. "We thought we could go back to the championship again last season

even if we took our foot a little bit off the gas pedal."

"Our team chemistry this season is already ahead of where it was this time last year. All the changes that have taken place allow returning players to take more responsibility," Schmid confidently adds.

The only validation of the Galaxy's success this season will come by winning silverware worthy only of their sparkling cathedral, The Home Depot Center.

In this case, "More in '04" means a second MLS Cup in three seasons.

It's a word that is tossed around these days with perhaps too much regularity; yet, when it comes to the history of Major League Soccer, it maybe has more meaning than usual. One day late last autumn, the soccer world woke up and the San Jose Earthquakes had won two MLS Cups in three seasons.

Can anyone say "dynasty?"

Two championships in three seasons maybe doesn't a dynasty make; still, the Quakes became the first team since D.C. United to claim more than

one championship when they were the first MLS "dynasty" in capturing three of the league's first four titles.

Even in these days of parity across the major sports scene, when teams can go from worst to first and back again with mad abandon, San Jose enters the 2004 MLS campaign with a target on their back as the team to beat – and there's no reason at the start to think the Quakes won't pick up where they left off.

Sure, there's a new coach in town, after Frank Yallop left after leading San Jose to those two MLS Cups to take over Canada's national team. But his replacement is Dominic Kinnear, one of the first of the new breed of MLS veterans on the field now moving into management. His new off-field boss? American soccer icon Alexi Lalas, last seen patrolling central defense for the Los Angeles Galaxy.

But beyond that, San Jose has seen fewer changes than most. They also learned to win without Landon Donovan, who still led the club in scoring and captured MLS Cup MVP honors despite a number of absences while away on national team duty – something that won't lessen this year as the USA chases qualification for Germany 2006.

Even so, despite their tenuous claims on dynasty, the Quakes

reached the final thanks only to one of the greatest comebacks in sports history, when they overcame a four-goal deficit in an hour to knock off bitter rival Los Angeles Galaxy in the playoffs. They then needed another comeback to survive the Kansas City Wizards in the Western Conference final.

But it's now that every team in the league again starts anew, all chasing the Alan I. Rothenberg Trophy as the symbol of U.S. soccer supremacy. And optimism abounds as they start the hunt.

Among the Western Conference rivals, the Galaxy won't need to begin their season with an eight-game road trip that essentially torpedoed their campaign. The Kansas City Wizards were minutes away from a trip to the MLS Cup Final, but will be without 2003 MLS Honda MVP Preki for much of this year. In Colorado, the Rapids look back on the final half of last season, where they righted their ship to become one of the feared sides in the league. And the Dallas Burn return to the Cotton Bowl as Colin Clarke rebuilds.

In the East, the Chicago Fire have perhaps as much a claim on "dynasty" as any, reaching the MLS Cup Final for the third time in their six-year history last season after winning the Supporters

Shield with the league's best regular-season record. But Zach Thornton and Carlos Bocanegra, integral pieces of the club's defense, must be replaced as they left for Europe in two of the higher-profile off-season moves.

The New England Revolution led the league in goals – and has the league's leading goalscorer in Taylor Twellman, even though he missed the final third of the season. MetroStars boss Bob Bradley must replace Clint Mathis, who moved to Germany, but found a number of young strikers a year ago. D.C. United has gained most of the offseason attention with 14-year-old Freddy Adu, but long-time Fire standout Peter Nowak has already demonstrated his aim in continuing the club's turnaround. And the Columbus Crew, touted as a possible finalist a year ago, also must fill a big hole in replacing Brian McBride, but made the most offseason moves of any team.

Hold on tight. If there's anything the first eight seasons of Major League Soccer have shown, once anyone thinks they've got it all figured out, someone comes out of nowhere to upset all the "experts."

The "Ra-Ra Boys" – the strike partnership of Best XI performer Ante Razov and Gatorade Rookie of the Year Damani Ralph – combined for 25 goals last season. Another Best XI honoree, U.S. international DaMarcus Beasley, should again cause defenses significant problems on the left side, while Jamaica international Andy Williams was impressive on the opposite side in the Fire's run to the MLS Cup Final.

One year ago, Dave Sarachan stepped into his first season as head coach of the Chicago Fire - and despite having to replace icons such as Peter Nowak and Hristo Stoitchkov, took the club to the MLS Cup Final after first claiming the U.S. Open Cup and the MLS Supporters' Shield as holders of the best record during the regular season.

In his second season, Sarachan could have an equally daunting rebuilding job ahead if the Fire are going to repeat the performance that led his being named MLS Coach of the Year. Carlos Bocanegra, the ADT Defender of the Year, and Zach Thornton, nominee for Goalkeeper of the Year, have both left to ply their trade in Europe (Bocanegra with Fulham in England, Thornton to Portugal's Benfica).

The goalkeeping responsibilities will fall to either Henry Ring – who played 11 minutes in 2003 – or U.S. U-23 'keeper D.J. Countess, acquired from the Dallas Burn. Sarachan will also have to begin the campaign without influential midfielder Jesse Marsch, who underwent offseason surgery.

The Rapids won just twice in their first 13 matches as they recovered from the hole left by the departure of Gilles Grimandi. But over the last part of the campaign head coach Tim Hankinson found the right formula as Colorado reeled off a seven-match winning streak and ended the season with a 13-match home unbeaten run, though the campaign ended with a playoff loss to Kansas City Wizards.

The spearhead of an at-times irresistible attack returns as Honda MVP candidate John Spencer, whose 14 goals were one off the league lead, partners Chris Carrieri up top. Mark Chung (11 goals, six assists) and Chris Henderson are again called upon to provide the service from their attacking midfield roles.

Former Jamaican international Darryl Powell, signed late in the campaign, will be looked upon to step into midfield and make an impact with U.S. international Pablo Mastroeni drop-

ping back into central defense to replace long-time Rapids campaigner Robin Fraser, dealt to Columbus Crew during the offseason.

Joe Cannon – the 2002 MLS Goalkeeper of the Year who was another late-season addition – has been handed the first-choice role between the posts as Scott Garlick was sent to Dallas to end the goalkeeping controversy that dogged the final days of the season.

The Columbus Crew began the 2003 campaign tapped by many pundits as a potential MLS Cup Finalist. But by the time the season had wound down, the Crew were the only Eastern Conference side left out of the playoffs, and changes were certainly in the offing.

The biggest change was an unwelcome one, as Brian McBride transferred to Fulham of England's Premier League, taking with him a team-high 12 goals. Young playmaker Diego Walsh was dealt to Kansas City, speedy flank player Brian West moved to Norway's second division in another transfer, and Northern Ireland international defender Mark Williams, Alex Pineda Chacon and Freddy Garcia were also not re-signed.

But Columbus coach Greg Andrulis was active in the offseason, picking up a number of veteran performers from around the league. Cultured central defender Robin Fraser was acquired from the Colorado Rapids, while Manny Lagos was offloaded by the MLS Cup champion San Jose Earthquakes. Combative midfielder Simon Elliott, a New Zealand international, was also picked up from the Los Angeles Galaxy.

Andrulis also made some key pickups from outside the league, selecting a pair of highly-touted defenders in Hermann Trophy winner Chris Wingert and U.S. youth international Chad Marshall, as well as U.S. under-23 midfielder David Testo from the Richmond Kickers of the A-League.

With the departure of McBride, the Crew attack will rely on Edson Buddle and Jeff Cunningham, who combined for 15 goals (Buddle with 10) despite both suffering through injury-plagued campaigns.



Clarke also picked up defender Carey Talley and wide midfielder Eric Quill from the Kansas City Wizards.

After four long seasons in the wilderness, the most decorated club in MLS history finally returned to the postseason when D.C. United qual-

ified for the 2003 MLS Cup Playoffs. It was a quick trip, losing 4-0 on aggregate to the Chicago Fire, but still good reward for a tense campaign that never left a knife's edge.

The rebuilding project that began prior to the 2003 season continued after hostilities had concluded when Ray Hudson was dismissed as head coach after two years at the helm. Replacing him is Peter Nowak, the long-time Chicago Fire stalwart who retired following the 2002 playing season.

It's hard not to feature Freddy Adu in any preview of United's fortunes, but Nowak has been quick to caution against too many expectations in the 14-year-old wunderkind – at least early on – despite his growing attraction and first selection overall in the MLS SuperDraft.

As one possible icon comes in, another has left - Marco Etcheverry, the heart and soul of United's first eight seasons - returned to his native Bolivia to likely finish his playing career. Hristo Stoitchkov also called time on his playing days - the pair finishing as two of United's top three

goalscorers, despite hitting for just 11 between them.

But Nowak has inherited some real talent. Bobby Convey showed the ability to step into Etcheverry's central midfield role in international play during the winter, and the rearguard is anchored by New Zealand international Ryan Nelsen. But goalkeeper Nick Rimando and livewire winger Ben Olsen are coming off knee injuries, as is Honduras fullback Milton Reyes, who missed all of 2003.

The Kansas City Wizards march that ended mere

seconds from a berth in the 2003 MLS Cup Final was put down to one "ageless wonder" – 40-year-old Preki. But Wizards boss Bob Gansler will have to find another talisman for at least the first half of this season if Kansas City is going to maintain its winning ways.

In 2003, Preki won his second Honda Most Valuable Player honor after winning the Budweiser Scoring Championship for the second time, collecting 12 goals and 17 assists while ever-present in the Kansas City lineup. But early in preseason, the former U.S. international suffered a broken leg and dislocated ankle that will likely leave him unavailable for three to four months.

An early candidate to pull the strings in midfield will be Diego Walsh, acquired during the winter (and before the Preki injury) from the Columbus Crew. But much will also be expected of the strike force, where Josh Wolff will be looking to avoid more injuries and where Wolde Harris will be with the club from the outset. Midfielders provided the punch last season, where Chris Klein came out of the engine room to score six goals,

behind only Preki and Igor Simutenkov (seven goals).

Jamaican international Shavar Thomas was acquired from the Dallas Burn to bolster a backline that had an up-and-down campaign, as Carey Talley and Eric Quill went the other way. Tony Meola will again be first-choice in goal, playing all but eight minutes last season, another "ageless wonder" at 35 years young.

Coming off the first MLS Cup championship in club history – and with the prospect of moving

into a new home – the 2003 campaign held nothing but promise for the Los Angeles Galaxy.

But going winless on their eightgame road trip to open the season (the Galaxy ended the season as the first in league history to go winless on their travels), the defending champions backed into the playoffs – only to have their hopes cruelly dashed in the remarkable comeback by the San Jose Earthquakes.

Though the offseason was unsettled, head coach Sigi Schmid survived and has maintained the core of his side for the 2004 season. The biggest departure came when playmaker Mauricio Cienfuegos – one of the icons of the club's success since the beginning of MLS – retired at season's end after more than 200 appearances in Galaxy colors.

The heart of the Galaxy rearguard all returns – a group which (along with San Jose Earthquakes) allowed a league-low 35 goals a season ago. But in an attempt to provide more regular service for Guatemala international Carlos Ruiz – who again finished atop the MLS goalscoring charts with 15 goals (tied with New England's Taylor

Twellman) – the Galaxy signed a pair of attacking talents.

Coming in to pull the strings in midfield is Andreas Herzog, who scored 26 goals in representing his native Austria 103 times in his international career – and U.S. international Jovan Kirovski, who comes home to MLS after plying his trade in England (Manchester United, Crystal Palace, Birmingham City), Germany (Borussia Dortmund, Fortuna Köln) and Portugal (Sporting Clube).

Last year's leading scorer, Clint Mathis, has moved on to Germany, though he hit for just two of his nine goals over the second half of the year. Veteran centerback Steve Jolley is also gone, traded to the Dallas Burn.


Dappointing campaign a year ago following their MLS Cup Final appearance, but a thrilling stretch run nearly saw them snatch the Eastern Conference berth in last year's title game. But just as a year ago, the New England Revolution's hopes are high despite the struggles of a year ago.

Taylor Twellman missed nearly the entire final third of the season through injury - and still finished tied with Los Angeles Galaxy striker Carlos Ruiz atop the MLS goalscoring charts. His highly anticipated partnership with Joe-Max Moore never materialized, yet Pat Noonan received a nomination for Gatorade Rookie of the Year*honors after his 10-goal regular season campaign was followed by two playoff goals. There is additional depth in Dario Fabbro and Chris Brown, both of whom showed good form after their late-season acquisition in a deal with Kansas City Wizards, for the attack that scored the most goals in MLS.

But unlike a year ago, Nicol can also rely on a central midfield pair from the outset which burst on the scene during the 2003 season. Grenada international Shalrie Joseph,

who took over the holding midfield role early in his rookie season, and playmaker José Carlos Cancela, signed halfway through the season, both help take pressure off the flank midfielders, Steve Ralston and Brian Kamler.

Goalkeeper Adin Brown also impressed as he grabbed the first-choice role behind an experienced back four of central defenders Carlos Llamosa and Rusty Pierce and fullbacks Joe Franchino and Jay Heaps that was a consistent rugged presence.



Movin' On Up

MLS showing signs of growing up as players continue their careers off the field · By Michael Lewis

As Major League Soccer enters its ninth season, there are several serious signs that the league is growing up.

Young, talented teenage players are considered not just the future, but the present of the league. Soccer-specific stadiums are becoming the norm. And retired players just don't fade away. They remain in the game – on the sidelines or in the front office.

A number of former players find themselves in transition this season. Former Chicago Fire star midfielder Peter Nowak will guide D.C. United. Dominic Kinnear, who plied his trade with the Colorado Rapids, Tampa Bay Mutiny and San Jose Clash, was promoted to head coach of the defending champion San Jose Earthquakes. John Harkes

has taken over as United's director of youth development. And one-time U.S. World Cup standout Alexi Lalas traded in his boots for wingtips to be the Earthquakes general manager and president.

"It is a natural thing to become a coach," said Nowak, as MLS follows a progression that happens in every soccer (and sports) league in the world.

Nowak, 39, took over the United reins without any pro coaching experience, but he figured his background and experience – a 23-year playing career that encompassed 10 clubs in Poland, Germany, Turkey, Switzerland and the U.S. – have gone a long way to prepare him.

"As captain of the (Polish) national team, Munich 1860 and the Fire, I had to decide on the field as a coach has to do," said Nowak, who played under former Fire and current MetroStars coach Bob Bradley for five seasons. "Working with Bob gave me an opportunity to see how this coaching job works."

Nowak, who retired after the 2002 season and worked in the Fire front office as director of international relations and soccer and business advisor, felt playing for several knowledgeable coaches helped him learn the game.

"You're getting the best of everything from the coaches you had," he said. "I have had a lot of conversations with Bruce (Arena, the U.S. national coach) and with Bradley. I bring a lot of things to the table."

But no one has to remind him how difficult it will be.

"It's going to be quite a challenge," he said. "There are trophies to win. I'm not saying we're a championship team, but we're going to work very hard. The challenge is to get the group of players and put them together and get them on the same page. It's practice, every single performance."

In contrast, Kinnear learned about MLS coaching intricacies as an assistant for three seasons

to Frank Yallop, who has moved onto to the Canadian national team top job. Former Earthquakes defender John Doyle, coincidentally, is Kinnear's assistant.


Kinnear, 36, learned as a player under former U.S. coach and current Honduran coach Bora Milutinovic.

"He maybe wasn't a great man manager, but he analyzed certain parts of the game very well," he said. In contrast, Yallop "handled players well and let them get rest. He treated them the way he wanted to be treated. It worked out great."

Being a head coach is completely different from being the first lieutenant. There is much more pressure.

"I will take the same approach Frank did the past three years," Kinnear said. "Obviously, I won't do a carbon copy of what Frank did."

Kinnear faces a unique challenge. For the first (Continued on page 44)

time in league history, a new coach inherits a championship team. He will have a companion in Lalas, a former U.S. teammate, who will be learning on the job.

Known for his signature long red hair and goatee, Lalas has had a clean-cut appearance in recent years. "I cleaned up on the outside, but I'm still a mess on the inside," he said, laughing.

He might have donned a new hat as a frontoffice worker, but that doesn't mean Lalas will wear a finely tailored suit every day on the job.

"Listen, I can only do this job as myself," he said. "People certainly have an idea of who I am. My personality inside and out has to come through. I would like to think that I am very open and honest and will try to cut through a lot of the BS out there. I can throw on a suit, which I do at different times. I can have jeans on, whatever. It's not always about the clothes."

His first priority was talking to Kinnear and the team.

"My responsibility to you guys is as follows: If Dominic needs anything to make his job easier, I

will do everything in my power to get him that," Lalas told them. "As far as the players are concerned, anything I can do to make them do their job better on the field, I will – with the understanding there are realities to MLS on and off the field. I can't just tell people what they want to hear.

"My other responsibilities are even greater off the field, and that's putting butts in the seats. I've come in and very quickly had to try to find out the good, the bad and the ugly. And there's plenty of all of it that exists in (San Jose)."

Lalas is getting a crash course on using resources wisely. Which is what MLS is doing with its former players.

So, don't be surprised if Nowak, Kinnear and Lalas are only the tip of the proverbial iceberg.

"Some players have done their homework," Kinnear said. "I think you'll see more players stepping back in."

Change Is Good

A host of young talent is ready to grab the limelight in Major League Soccer · By Jason Halpin

rom the outside looking in, it's hard not to look at the virtual cavalcade of MLS stars heading for Europe, South America and the front office this offseason as a sort of exodus of the league's brightest lights.

Marco Etcheverry, Brian McBride, Mauricio Cienfuegos, Clint Mathis, Alexi Lalas, Zach Thornton, Carlos Bocanegra - they're all gone. But what's lost in all of this is the fact that as they've all moved on for opportunities elsewhere, they opened the door for a new group of players to thrust themselves into the limelight.

The departures of Bocanegra, the 2003 ADT MLS Defender of the Year and goalkeeper Thornton left a hole in the Chicago Fire defense. With a solid defensive crew - including C.J. Brown and Jim Curtin - staying in town and head coach Dave Sarachan selecting four defenders in January's

SuperDraft, the Eastern Conference champion's back line is still in decent shape.

The primary question in the Windy City is the goalkeeping situation, which could be touchand-go. But while untested Henry Ring and second-round pick Matt Pickens have a step on the first-choice role, Sarachan might have found his eventual No. 1 selection when D.J. Countess was acquired from the Dallas Burn. The young 'keeper will have a tremendous opportunity to prove his sub-par stats from last year were due more to a porous defense than poor goalkeeping.

Elsewhere, the departures of McBride and Mathis have invited some young players to step into their goalscoring shoes and, consequently, into stardom. Columbus Crew forward Edson Buddle has had two solid seasons the past two years, and with McBride gone he will get a chance to be the top man in Columbus. Offseason upgrades in the midfield and the resigning of forward Jeff Cunningham could well provide the youngster quality service for a real breakout season.

In New Jersey, one question prevails in discussions of Mathis' decision to play in the German Bundesliga: Who will score for the MetroStars? The central midfield at Giants Stadium is strong - with Bolivian international Joselito Vaca joining Amado Guevara in the creative role - but neither are known for scoring goals.

Instead, Eddie Gaven - the youngest player on the U.S. Under-23 team at February's CONCACAF Olympic qualifying tournament - will be expected to increase his responsibilities as an attacking midfielder or up front. Gaven is looking a bit bigger and more physical this spring, meaning he won't get muscled off the ball as much as he did last season - especially as he continues to work hard to look for his opportunities.

Guevara, the key piece to the MetroStars' cen-

tral midfield, could also find himself in the spotlight this season. With Marco Etcheverry returning to his native Bolivia and Cienfuegos hanging up his spikes, a generation of classic South American "number 10s" is all but gone from MLS. The playmaking midfielder is rare now, but Guevara and New England Revolution midfielder Jose Cancela could represent a rebirth.

Both Guevara and Cancela joined their clubs after the start of the 2003 campaign and went on to display deft touch and creative passing. With a season under their belts, both could explode this year, with Guevara giving the MetroStars a fulcrum and Cancela making the Revolution offense multi-dimensional.

Etcheverry's departure also leaves an opening for a leader on the D.C. United roster. Earnie Stewart, who came to D.C. last year after spending several years in Europe, is a likely candidate to assume El Diablo's role, but Bobby Convey cannot be forgotten. Convey thrived as the go-to-guy for the U.S. Under-20 team at the 2003 World Youth Championship in December, and a similar performance for United this season could lift the attacking midfielder to a higher level of stardom.

He could also do a lot to take some pressure off Freddy Adu and first-year coach Peter Nowak.

The silver lining to this past off-season and the departure of several of MLS' most popular and most talented players is this: someone will fill every gap. There are scores of players who have been waiting for their chance, and this is it. The names have changed, but the game is the same.

Freddymania Strikes MLS

D.C. United's No. I pick, I4-year-old Freddy Adu is professional sport's youngest-ever player

Some 30 years ago, Pelé took the field at Randall's Stadium for the New York Cosmos as they faced the Dallas Tornado on national television on a sun-baked June day. That's how far you have to go to find anywhere near the kind of impact

on the sport that Freddy Adu has brought since signing with Major League Soccer.


Just days before the MLS Cup Final, the 14-yearold announced he was signing with the league and would be the No. 1 pick overall in the 2004

SuperDraft by D.C. United, which would allow the young talent to live at home with his mother Emelia as he began his professional career.

It's been a whirlwind ride since: appearances on The Late Show with David Letterman, ESPN's Cold Pizza and The Jimmy Kimmel Show, countless interviews, and even a little soccer as he joined the U.S. Under-20 team at the World Youth Championships in the United Arab Emirates and the Under-23 team in Mexico for their failed bid to qualify for the Olympic Games.

But throughout Freddy's megawatt smile has never failed to captivate as he's crossed over into the realm of celebrity, arguably becoming the league's most-recognized player before he's kicked a ball in a game.

"I really just want to earn the respect of my teammates," Adu said. "I can't wait to get out there on the field with them and just play hard. I want to play hard and keep my mouth shut and kind of work my way into things. I have to earn that right and let my play do the talking and hopefully I'll earn the respect of my teammates, and then we'll take it from there."


Freddy won't join United until the season has already begun, after finishing his accelerated high school program at the IMG Academy in Bradenton, Fla. But United spent its first portion of preseason training in Bradenton so Adu could get some work in with the club without missing class. Adu ended his first day of work by carrying a large water cooler from the field.

"I'm the new guy. I'm going to do that. If I don't do it, I know I'm going to hear from the guys," Adu said. "But really, that's just stuff you've got to do. No matter who you are, you don't think you're bigger than anybody else. It's a team thing. You go in, you're a rookie,

you do all that stuff. I'm not complaining. Whatever it takes to help the team out, I'll do it."

Adu might have been the smallest player on the field during the initial training sessions, but he looked far from out of place. Competing against older players has been a regular staple of Freddy's youth.

"If coach puts me on the field, whether it's starting or coming in (off the bench), I know I can produce," Adu said. "I'm not really worried about that, because I've played against the MLS guys and I




New United coach Peter Nowak has seen some of what his young charge will face after turning pro at age 15 himself. Photo: WireImage/Al Messerschmidt


know what I can do against them and I'm going to go in with confidence and I'm not going to be scared of anyone."

United's new coach, former Chicago Fire standout Peter Nowak, has already told his young charge that he does not have the expectations of the club on his shoulders, and that he will earn his place in the lineup on merit.

"I told him if you deserve to be on the field you are going to be on the field," Nowak said. "You have to prove it to us that you deserve this spot."



But Nowak also knows some of what Adu will face, having turned professional at age 15 in his native Poland.

"It's going to be very different for him," said Nowak, "and we have to make sure that he is going to mature in a good way, that he is going to grow up in a good way and that he is going to be a great professional. This is our goal in his development. He is a jewel, there is no question about it, and the first year as [a] professional is not always easy."

Adu will certainly be in another environment that will still allow him to be a 14-year-old. His mom has also reminded him he'll be doing the dishes at night when he comes home from the office - the United training field at RFK Stadium - and that there won't be shirking any other chores.

Then on the field, every day, he'll have the chance to fulfill a lifelong dream. And he can't wait.

"I just play. You let your game do the talking and have fun. I'm playing to get better and to make it because your job is never secure," he said.

"These guys have been there, done that. They're great guys. They tell me: 'Just listen to the coach and play your game. Don't put too much pressure on yourself.' I say: 'Hey, you guys make me feel comfortable.' That's when I play my best, when I feel comfortable."





dice Ruiz con voz pausada, pero mostrando su orgullo, en algo que se traduce fácilmente lo mismo en inglés que en español.







"I began playing with the Escondido Heat and then went on to join the La Jolla Nomads."


What other sports did you play growing up besides soccer?

When did you first start dreaming of becoming a professional soccer player?


"I've wanted to do that since I first started playing at age four. For as long as I can remember, it's been the only thing that I've wanted to do."

You achieved your goal of playing professional soccer. Was there anyone along the way that took a chance on you during your career?

"Alex Ferguson with Manchester United was the first person to take on chance on me and at that age (15), you really never know if a player will make it. But, that was the key opportunity for me to learn the game in a great environment at the right place."

How did Manchester United discover you? "It's a long story, but to make it short. I was with the regional Olympic Development team and was spotted by a scout."

Do you remember your first appearance with the U.S. National Team?

"Yeah, we played against Trinidad & Tobago in my

first game with the national team and then I scored my first goal against Jamaica."

Talk about your path after leaving Manchester United?

"I was in Germany for four years with Borussia Dortmond, but in that time I went on loan for a year to Cologne, then I went to Sporting Lisbon (Portugal) for a year. Then, I spent a year with Crystal Palace and two years with Birmingham City."

What are your goals for the upcoming season with the Galaxy?

"First, I just want to play week in and week out, but the main thing is for the team to win and to try to win the MLS Cup."

How important a factor was getting back into the U.S. National Team in your decision to return to play in MLS? "That was another important reason for me to be able to play week in and week out for Bruce (Arena) to see me more often and to be

available for all of the National Team games, especially with all of the qualifiers coming up this summer. It gives me a really good shot at getting on the team and really establishing myself."

What is your advice to a young player looking to become a professional?

"Work hard and make sure that you are having fun. Don't do it just to do it. You have to really love the game to truly be successful at it."

GALAXY DRIVE SERIES ... The Galaxy Drive Series allows the Galaxy to team up with its fans to assist the community at-large by collecting much-needed




LA Galaxy soccer through the years

The Los Angeles Galaxy's appearance in 2003 MLS Cup Playoffs was their eighth in the eight-year history of Major League Soccer. They are the only MLS team to have accomplished this feat.

Los Angeles Galaxy forward **Alejandro Moreno** became the 13th and latest member of the present Galaxy team to earn an international cap when he suited for his native Venezuela on February 18 when the *vinotintos* hosted Australia in Caracas.


Los Angeles Galaxy 2004 first round MLS SuperDraft selection **Joseph Ngwenya** was the first-ever first round draft pick in any sport from Coastal Carolina University.

Los Angeles Galaxy forward **Carlos Ruiz** became the first player in Major League Soccer history to lead the league in goals scored in each of his first two seasons when he scored 24 in 2002 and 15 in 2003.



Crabavoy led Indiana University to the 2003 NCAA Division I National Championship. Grabavoy scored 11 goals for the Hoosiers and was named a first team NSCAA All-American.

The Galaxy have an all-time record of 5-2 in matches played in Europe, including the three games they played in France during the 2004 preseason.
